



Rep. Glen Bradley to Introduce Resolution in N.C. Legislature Against “Indefinite Detention”

North Carolina Rep. Glen Bradley, (R-49), a founding member of [Oath Keepers](#), confirmed today his intention to introduce a resolution in the General Assembly to address the unconstitutional provisions in the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2012, which authorizes the “indefinite detention” of U.S. Citizens, “indefinitely expands” the [Authorization for the Use of Military Force](#),” and essentially designates America as part of the “battlefield,” thus placing the United States under the “law of war.” ([Click here for video interview.](#))

President Obama signed the [2012 NDAA](#) into law on Dec. 31, 2011. In his [signing statement](#), President Obama stated, “...I want to clarify that my Administration will not authorize the indefinite military detention without trial of American citizens.” The President did not say that he “could not” detain U.S. citizens “indefinitely,” he said he would not. The “requirement” for military to detain in H.R. 1540’s conference report, Section 1022 is not a “prohibition” against it.

In his signing statement, President Obama, expressing his dissatisfaction with several sections of the bill stated, “...should any application of these provisions conflict with my constitutional authorities, I will treat the provisions as non-binding.” If the President thought parts were unconstitutional, why did he sign it?

Rep. Glen Bradley confirmed his support for the resolution and his intent to introduce it, stating,

“I definitely support this [[Patriot Coalition / Oath Keepers NDAA](#)] resolution. I’ve had a chance to pour over it, and it is critical that we make statements at the state and federal level that we’re going to oppose this indefinite detention, and if we don’t, then why are we here?”

“No matter how hard it is, you cannot vote to abrogate the Constitution,” said Rep. Bradley. “That is a direct violation of the oath that we took, and it’s absolutely critical that we understand that obeying the Constitution is the only thing that’s going to keep our nation intact.”

Rep. Bradley continued, *“If we’re willing to vote to abrogate the Constitution for political considerations, then we don’t need to be here, period.”*

According to Rep. Bradley, 2012 is the ‘short session’ for the N.C. General Assembly, but that only “non-controversial bills” will move. Republican House Speaker Tom Tillis, and House Majority Leader Paul “Skip” Stam are who will determine whether or not defending the Constitution is “non-controversial” or not.



“Those are the two gentlemen who are going to have the most influence on getting this moving. If they don’t want this to move, it won’t move,” Rep. Glen Bradley advised.

I advised Rep. Bradley to let us know if he gets any indication from the Republican leadership that they think defending the Constitution is “controversial.” *We the People* need to know, and will rally to its defense.
